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# Legal background

Article 7(1) of Directive 98/71/EC on the legal protection of designs:


'A design right shall not subsist in features of appearance of a product which are solely dictated by its technical function.'


Two opposing legal traditions in interpreting this provision:


- (a) "Multiplicity of forms" theory
- (b) "Causation" theory




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




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### **EUIPO BoA Case R-690/2007-3**








#### **DOCERAM** – case C-395/16





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# **CJEU** findings

- In order to determine whether the features of appearance of a product are exclusively dictated by its technical function, it must be established that the technical function is the only factor which determined those features, the existence of alternative designs not being decisive in that regard.
- the national court must take account of all the objective circumstances relevant to each individual case, including:
  - -the design at issue
  - -the objective circumstances indicative of the reasons which dictated the choice of features of appearance of the product concerned
  - -information on use of the design
  - -the existence of alternative designs which fulfil the same technical function.
- there is no need to base the findings on the perception of an 'objective observer'.



# 5 key takeaways

- To survive challenge on grounds of functionality, it is not enough to show that alternative designs performing the same function are available
- 2) (Still) no requirement for 'aesthetic' quality
- Nature and field of design likely to influence evidential burden
- 4) Evidence of design process could be critical
- 5) Alternative designs will continue to play a role
